

Interview Roleplay Scenarios

Here are a few interview roleplay scenarios which you may wish to practice with friends or family to improve your confidence and ability to think on the spot!

Patient Communication:

Role: You are a medical student at a UK hospital.

Interviewer: The interviewer portrays a patient with a chronic condition, frustrated with the NHS waiting times and concerned about continuity of care. Demonstrate your ability to communicate effectively, address the specific concerns about the NHS, and provide reassurance regarding the management of their chronic condition within the system.

Ethical Dilemma:

Interviewer: The interviewer plays a policymaker discussing the challenges in promoting primary care within the NHS. Articulate the importance of strengthening primary care services in the UK, address potential barriers, and propose strategies to enhance the role of primary care in the NHS.

Public Health Engagement:

Role: You are a medical student interested in public health.

Interviewer: The interviewer takes on the role of a public health official discussing the implementation of a new public health initiative within the NHS. Discuss the potential impact on population health, integration with NHS services, and your role as a future healthcare professional in supporting such initiatives.

Time Management Under Pressure:

Role: You are a medical student on a busy hospital ward

Interviewer: The interviewer is a senior doctor presenting you with multiple urgent tasks. Demonstrate your ability to prioritize, organize, and manage time effectively under pressure while maintaining a focus on patient safety and care.

Ethical Dilemma in Research:

Role: You are a researcher

Interviewer: The interviewer presents an ethical dilemma related to your research. Discuss your ethical considerations, your commitment to research integrity, and how you would navigate the situation to ensure ethical standards are upheld.

Lifelong Learning and Professional Development:

Role: You are a healthcare professional discussing your commitment to continuous learning and professional development with the interviewer. Highlight your awareness of the importance of staying updated with current medical practices, attending relevant conferences, and participating in ongoing education to provide the best patient care.
